## PARISH CHURCH NEWS

#### Dear Friends,

Recent months have seen extraordinary changes on the global political scene, and we are still awaiting clarity over how things will pan out for us domestically in 2017, but it is in times of uncertainty and change that we can take the greatest comfort and assurance from building our lives on Jesus, the one Rock of assurance and placing our trust in his unchanging and unfailing grace.

In November, I visited Turkey and met with many Christian refugees from the Middle East who have been displaced there. We may feel unsettled here, but when we compare ourselves and our lives to those who have been the most affected by the evils of our age, it becomes clear than sometimes we don't know how good we have it! I heard harrowing personal tales of persecution and atrocity, and - following the launch of Open Doors' World Watch List 2017 in Parliament last month (detailing the 50 most dangerous places for Christians to live) - recognise that the experiences that I heard about in the Middle East are but a drop in the ocean of the suffering and persecution to which people are being exposed around the world.

This may all sound rather depressing, but the incredible thing that came over to me despite it all was the remarkable peace and joy that these Christians had found in the face of such horrors. Literally millions of people across the Middle East have come to find peace and hope through Jesus in the last two decades, and as we ourselves try to find our own way forward through different murky waters - we can learn a great deal from their experience. It's my prayer that in 2017 you will discover some of the same peace and assurance for yourselves, whatever you yourselves are facing.

下 と	Pheasant Normandy  6-8 Cox's apples 2 pheasants
こと	<ul> <li>2 pheasants</li> <li>200g (7oz) butter</li> <li>2 tbsp calvados if you have any</li> </ul>

Ķ	Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Peel, core and slice the apple into quarters. Brown pheasants all over in 100g of the butter in a flameproo cast-iron casserole with a lid. If you are using calvados, warm it in a separa pan, pour over the birds and light it immediately. Take care to stand well back as singed eyebrows add nothing to this dish.
***	Now take the birds out of the pan and stuff them with the lemon halves and the sprigs of rosemary. Tip the pan juices into the cavities too, making sure none spills out; set aside. Now add the rest of the butter to the pan and fry the apples, sprinkling the cinnamon over them. When slightly softened, re- turn the pheasants to the casserole, breast side down. Sprinkle over the cel- ery salt and pepper, then pour over the cider and cream.
·	Cover and cook for 50 minutes to an hour, until done. Serve with boiled po- tatoes, chopped parsley and a green salad.
