PARISH CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends,

If you walked into an empty room and saw a brick sitting in the middle of the floor, you'd be forgiven for asking a few questions about it. You'd laugh at anyone who even suggested that 'it just happened'. Curiosity would make us ask both how and why it got there.

At this time of year, when the lengthening daylight hours and growing warmth bring new beginnings and new life into view, I find myself asking similar questions - how does this all come about, and why? I am deeply unsatisfied by the only plausible answer that atheist materialism can offer: that 'it just happens'. The assertion that the complexity of the entire Universe just came into being all on its own, and that our lives and the order and predictability of everything around can be reduced to the result of pure chance simply doesn't square up with my wider experience of life.

As a scientist, I delight in science's insights into the mechanisms and detail of the world that bursts into life each Spring, but to maintain my integrity as a scientist, I must also acknowledge its limits. Science claims no insight into 'why' we are here, any more than a chemist could analyse a birthday cake in the laboratory and deduce why it was made. For explanations of 'why' we are here, we need to look not just at the subset of evidence explored by science at the molecular or atomic level. Rather, we must consider an altogether more meaningful type of evidence at a personal level - precisely the type of evidence that is weighed in a law-court each day and the same category of evidence that we weigh in our everyday lives: the evidence of history and of personal testimony.

At Easter, Christians remember and celebrate the solid facts of history. No self-respecting historian would question that Jesus Christ died on a cross 2000 years ago outside Jerusalem. People have found it hard to understand and take on board, but another historical fact which changed history, changed our understanding of who Jesus is, and even defined our calendars, is his resurrection from the dead. These historical events stand at the heart of a deeper understanding of our existence than science even begins to explore, and the evidence of personal testimony - of those who witnessed those events, and of the billions who have since come to know and experience the risen Jesus in their own lives - affirms the truth that God, our creator, not only loves us and wants us to know him, but that he would stop at nothing to bring us back to himself.

Whatever is going on in your life, remember that God is a God of new beginnings, so why don't you come along to one of the events or services going on over Easter in the 5 Villages or in Chippy to celebrate. Happy Easter!

HOT CROSS BREAD & BUTTER PUDDING



This tasty bread and butter pudding recipe is a great way to turn stale hot cross buns into a fantastic Easter dessert. If you like, add an extra handful of dried fruit, chopped nuts or a pinch of mixed spice to the baking dish before pouring over the custard.

INGREDIENTS

6 Hot Cross Buns 500g Custard 50g Butter 1 Orange (Zest Only)

METHOD

Pour the custard into a small saucepan over a gentle heat and warm through, stirring regularly.

Slice the hot cross buns in half and spread with the butter, then arrange across a 1Lt baking dish.

Pour over the warm custard, ensuring that it is evenly distributed over the buns.

Set aside to rest at room temperature for 10-15 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas mark 4.

Sprinkle the orange zest over the top of the pudding and bake in the oven for **20-25 minutes**, until golden.

Once cooked, leave to cool for a few minutes before dividing between bowls. Happy Easter

SALFORD WILLS TRANSCRIBED

A small group of my friends joined me in transcribing the Salford Wills. They have generously given their time and skill to the project. I deposited the finished Salford documents in the **Oxford History Centre** last week, where they can be studied. There is a copy of the original will to accompany the transcripts, together with an introduction to explain how the project got started and the spread-sheets, lists and some ecclesiastical information on Salford's History. The earliest will to date for Salford, is for 'Martin of Salford' Chaplain, who died in 1348, a remarkable record, written in Latin; and one of the most notable, one of 1548 for Sir Mathew Smythe, Rector of Salford, Principal of Kings Hall and Brasenose College in the University of Oxford.

We are now working on the Little Rollright, Cornwell and Chastleton Wills. The money towards costs for sourcing wills from The National Archives, Oxford History Centre, Private Archives etc. came from the dis-banded Salford History Group, which had some money left in its account.

All time skill and labour was given for the love of History.
